Layperson's Summary: The existing law requires the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission (SECD) to develop a plan that would identify suitable areas for building offshore wind energy developments by June 30th, 2023. The SECD is also required to create megawatt planning goals for 2030 and 2045. This bill would require the SECD, in consultation with the California Coastal Commission and the State Lands Commission, to create a "2nd-phase plan" for offshore wind energy developments and create a strategy for seaport readiness by December 31, 2026. The SECD must also conduct a study on the feasibility of achieving in-state assembly and manufacturing of offshore wind energy projects and submit a report on the study to the Governor and Legislature by December 31, 2027. Layperson's Summary: Existing law requires certain transportation planning agencies to prepare and adopt regional transportation plans which must include a sustainable communities strategy, which aims to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles in the region. The bill would also require a metropolitan planning organization to submit the technical methodology used to estimate emissions before starting a public process and require the state board to review and approve the strategy within 180 business days. Additionally, the bill would require project nominations for the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program to demonstrate how the project would contribute to achieving the state's greenhouse gas emission reduction targets. Layperson's Summary: The state government has an organization called the Transportation Agency which oversees the California Highway Patrol, Department of Motor Vehicles, Department of Transportation, High-Speed Rail Authority, and the Board of Pilot Commissioners. All of these are under the supervision of a Secretary of Transportation, who is responsible for transportation projects. This bill would require the Transportation Agency, Department of Transportation, and California Transportation Commission to incorporate certain principles into their program funding guidelines and processes when applicable and cost-effective starting January 1, 2025. Layperson's Summary: This bill would make it so that certain public and residential facilities, such as gas stations, bars, public libraries and residential hotels, must post opioid antagonist kits that include an instructional poster and nasal spray, and have to replenish these kits after each use or upon expiration. It also would protect these facilities and their employees from civil liability if they provide aid with an opioid antagonist and would prohibit employers from requiring their employees to render aid or from disciplining an employee for not doing so in the event of an apparent overdose. The State Department of Public Health would be required to publish a list of counties experiencing an opioid crisis and provide free opioid antagonist kits to designated facilities in those counties and create an instructional poster. Violations of this bill would result in a civil penalty of up to \$100, except for public entities and public employees. The Division of Occupational Safety and Health is required to investigate and enforce the provisions in this bill and the state may have to reimburse certain local agencies and school districts for costs mandated by the state. Layperson's Summary: The Political Reform Act of 1974 regulates how campaign funds held by candidates for elective office, elected officers and campaign committees can be used. It currently states that if a candidate or elected officer has received verified threats to physical safety then they can use campaign funds (up to \$5000) to help pay for installing and monitoring a home or office electronic security system. This bill would eliminate the conditions put in place by the act and instead allow a candidate or elected officer to use campaign funds to pay for installing and monitoring a home or office electronic security system as well providing personal security to the candidate, elected officer, their immediate family and staff, as long as it is for a political, legislative or government purpose. It also states that the security system must be returned to the committee that paid for it or the relevant people have to reimburse the campaign fund account and report it to the Fair Political Practices Commission. The bill would require local agencies to impose alternative fire life and safety standards including a smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm, a fire extinguisher, and fast exits. Layperson's Summary: The Planning and Zoning Law requires local agencies to conduct public hearings for certain applications (e.g. variances). It also prohibits cities and counties from having more than 5 hearings if the housing development project meets a certain criteria before January 1, 2030. Additionally, local agencies are required to ministerially approve applications for accessory dwelling units or junior accessory dwellings, and can't deny applications for unpermitted units constructed before January 1, 2018. The law also requires ministerially approval for certain housing development projects (two residential units within a single-family residential zone) and parcel maps for urban lot splits. The Middle Class Housing Act defines housing development projects as an allowable use on certain parcels. Furthermore, the Department of Housing and Community Development must notify cities, counties and the Attorney General of any violations or failure to comply with the state housing laws. It requires the commission to post certain information on its website and authorizes them to set a maximum gross gasoline refining margin and penalties for any refiner that exceed it. The bill also requires the commission to consider requests for exemption from the maximum margin and to deposit any penalties collected into the Price Gouging Penalty Fund. It also requires the California State Auditor to complete an audit and performance review of the maximum gross gasoline refining margin and penalty, as well as require commission and the State Air Resources Board to prepare a Transportation Fuels Transition Plan. In addition, it establishes the Division of Petroleum Market Oversight in the commission and the Independent Consumer Fuels Advisory Committee to advise them. Lastly, the bill changes the reporting requirement and increases the amount for civil penalties imposed. (Based on 03/28/2023 text)
